Inspiring The American Spirit By Roger S. Williams

"...within all Americans and each American, grounded in our nation's founding principles, for our continuing journey toward a more perfect Union." So reads the mission statement on page 13 of the 273 page report delivered to the Executive Branch on December 31, 2019 by the United States Semiquincentennial Commission (USSC), under its more consumer friendly moniker, "America 250". It is no surprise that the themes of the commission, "Educate, Engage, Unite" are so similar to goals to which we subscribe as members of the Sons of the American Revolution.

We are all proud of our patriot ancestors. We can only imagine the sacrifice they and their families endured from 1774 to 1783 and beyond. Our nation's war for independence was a civil war. Our ancestors had to make the commitment to join "The Cause", or remain loyal to their King. The decisions our ancestors made from that time to the present day have been about self-determination and the pursuit of happiness. As humankind will attest, comparatively, we live in freedom. But this freedom is not without the sacrifice by those before us, and among us, who fought to protect the enlightenment ideals and principles of our founding fathers. Our compatriots in other state societies and around the globe honor veterans, teach our children about our history, and serve society. We, members of the New Jersey Society of the SAR have a unique charge to do the same...and more.

We are stewards of the land on which more battles, skirmishes and engagements were fought for our nation's independence. George Washington's retreat through "The Jerseys" in 1776 was followed by his resolve at Trenton, the encampment at Jockey Hollow, the Forage Wars, Connecticut Farms and ultimately victory. As we march toward the Semiquincentennial we have both opportunity and challenges to fulfill our goals of the SAR in honoring our ancestors and promoting the ideals of founding fathers to our fellow citizens.

Our towns, our land, our backyards were scenes of struggle,

bloodshed and pain. We are the Garden State. The forage from our farms feed Continental troops and militia from New England to North Carolina who all came to the Jerseys

to fight the Crown troops and the Tory regiments who ravaged our lands. Today, there are ghosts of these vicious struggles that survive. The Sutphin House. The Clarke House. The Benjamin Cooper House. Echoes of musket shot...shouts of Hessians Fusiliers, British Grenadiers and Scottish Highlanders launching

bayonet charges against our ancestors. Cannonade of artillery from Mahwah to Cape May - Elizabethtown to Ft. Mercer. As we march toward the Semiquincentennial now is OUR call to arms.

In 2018, the New Jersey legislature passed A-4194/S-2738, which, if fully funded, will allocate \$500,000 each year until 2026 toward preparing New Jersey's sites for the 250th commemorations. In March the NJ Historical Commission (NJHC), and its non-profit partner, Crossroads of the Revolution will be announcing that approximately two dozen sites throughout the state will be benefit from a public/private partnership fundraising initiative. Note the language in the last two sentences; "...if fully funded..." and "...two dozen sites...". We, the NJSSAR will need to engage here. Compatriots will need to lobby their local state representatives to see that this legislation fully funds this initiative each year. And, even if it is fully funded, \$500,000 only goes so far. There are about 140 sites that were assessed by NJHC/Crossroads. The fundraising focus will only be for about two dozen. Our mission will be to support those fundraising efforts, but also to support all other sites within our chapters to take advantage of the national focus on America 250. Respectfully Submitted,

November 15, 2019 Chapter Meeting

Our November meeting was held in the Westfield Community Center located at 425 E. Broad St in Westfield. The program was open to the public and light refreshments were served. Our featured speaker was John U. Rees, author of the recently published "They Were Good Soldiers: African-Americans Serving in the Continental Army, 1775-1783." Mr. Rees has more than 30 years experience writing about the lives of Continental Army soldiers in the American Revolution. John U. Rees, a lifelong resident of Bucks County, has been writing about common soldiers' experiences in the War for American Independence for over 30 years, on subjects ranging from battle studies, army food, and the soldier's burden, to army wagons and watercraft, campaign shelters, Continental Army conscription, and women with the army.

January 31, 2020 Chapter Meeting

Our January meeting featured a presentation by Lance Ashworth, President of the Friends of the Fishkill Supply Depot. In his presentation, "The Fishkill Supply Depot: Saving the Last Great Revolutionary War Site," Mr. Ashworth spoke about the historic significance of the Fishkill depot and encampment for the Continental Army and General George Washington, the multiple critical purposes it served in the Revolutionary War, and extensive current efforts to preserve the site—where graves of dozens of Continental soldiers have been identified—in the face of encroaching development. Mr. Ashworth, who lives in Fishkill, N.Y., is a graduate of the United States Military Academy at West Point and



served in the active U.S. Army where he achieved the rank of Captain. Under his direction, the FOFSD has reached significant milestones: achieving federal 501[c](3) not-for-profit status; creating and overseeing (in partnership with Fishkill Historical Society) an annual Revolutionary War Weekend encampment; and expanding strategic relationships at the local, state, and federal levels. As primary grants-writer, he obtained a \$24,600 grant from the National Park Service American Battlefield Protection Program to create a first-ever comprehensive technical report of the more than 3 dozen known archaeological digs to have occurred at the Supply Depot site since the beginning of the last century.

Great Work on the SAR Patriot Research System

The SAR Patriot Research System (PRS) is a database combination of the previous SAR Patriot Record Index, the SAR Revolutionary War Graves Registry, and information from the SAR Patriot Index CD (2002), plus additional information and updates from various state grave registry databases and patriot biographical sketches submitted to tell the story of our patriot ancestors.

Gary O. Walling was presented with the Lafayette Medal for Volunteer Service at the November 15 meeting of the Monmouth Chapter SAR by NJ State President Robert Meyer and Chapter President Ed Glidden. Compatriot Walling has been assimilating information from member applications, DAR Patriot records, Grave locations through the Find A Grave database and other sources and entering it into an updated format for the National Society.

The Seabrook House

The Seabrook's were early residents of Monmouth County, New Jersey. Thomas Seabrook, the son of Mary Brown and Daniel Seabrook, was born on February 16, 1735. He earned the rank of Lieut. Colonel in the Revolutionary War and married Martha Tallman, with whom he had five children: Stephen, Thomas Jr., Hannah, Mary, and Martha.



Stephen Seabrook, Martha and Thomas's son, was born in 1759. Like his father, he fought in the Revolutionary War.

Thomas Seabrook Sr. was Captain, First Regiment, Monmouth County Militia.

First Major, Col. George Taylor's First Regiment, Monmouth County Militia, prior to 12 April 1777; commanded detachment of his Regiment, on the march to Amboy, April 1776. He was Lieutenant Colonel in Colonel Nathaniel Scudder's First Regiment, Monmouth County Militia, 28th November 1776.

He was Lieutenant Colonel, Colonel Charles Read's

Regiment of Brig. General Mattias Williamson's Brigade of State Troops, November 27, 1776. The Regiment consisted of three companies from Middlesex, two companies from Monmouth and three companies from Burlington Counties.

Lieutenant Colonel Seabrook resigned his commission on 18 April 1778 to be appointed a member of the General Assembly from Monmouth County. A position he held until

1781. He was a member of many patriotic committees-one that demanded retaliation for the murder of Capt. Huddy. He also signed the General Articles of Retaliation in 1778.

After the Rebellion he was active in the local government affairs in Middletown. From 1789 until 1793 he was Commissioner of Appeals. 1799 until 1803 he was the Judge of Elections.

Lieut. Colonel Thomas Seabrook, my Primary Patriotic Ancestor died in Middletown, NJ on February 22 1805 aged 67 years, 11 months.

Bayshore Waterfront Park Activity Center

The Bayshore Waterfront Park Activity Center (Seabrook-Wilson House), one of the oldest surviving houses in the region. This large frame building, dating back to the early 1700's, was constructed in several phases over the course of two hundred years. The Park System acquired the building from Middletown Township in 1998. The building has been fully restored and now hosts Park System nature and history programs. In the past the Color Guard's primary mission was to present and retire the Colors at State meetings. The new Color Guard under Commander Meyer's leadership and with assistance from Sergeant Ed Glidden, Captain Dick Blundin and Lieutenant/Adjutant Rich Serfass has reached both nationally and Statewide to bring patriotism, recognition, and honor to historic events.

The NJSSAR Color Guard has been present at more than twenty-five events this past year. Nationally they included the SAR National Congress, the SAR Leadership Conferences, and the Atlantic Middle State Conference. Statewide they include the Battle of Bound Brook, Princeton Battlefield, The Middlesex History and Jersey State Fairs, the Proprietary House, Springfield's 225th Anniversary, the Battle of Monmouth, with wreath laying ceremonies at Fort Lee, the New

NOTES FROM THE NJSSAR OCTOBER 26, 2019 BOARD OF MANAGERS MEETING

The October 26, 2019 New Jersey Society Sons of the American Revolution Board of Managers Meeting (BOM) was Held at the Princeton Marriott from 10 AM to 12 PM.

- President Meyer opened the meeting by saying that many battlefields in NJ have been designated as a National Event and he thanked all that have contributed to this achievement but cautioned that much more needs to be done.
- Pennsylvania will host the 2021 National Congress - What better place than the City of Philadelphia. NJ, De and PA will all assist in this effort.
- Roger Williams 250th Semiquin Chair reported that Princeton was sanctioned as a National Event and there will be a wreath laying during the Ten Crucial Days/Patriots week. He also asked members to develop ideas for celebrating the 250th Anniversary in our area.
- Treasurer Warren Fristensky reported that Bruce Ryno, Registrar, Ed Glidden Secretary and Himself have all kept in constant contact to ensure timely processing of all new members, supplemental and reinstatement transactions.
- 63 new members were added year-to-date.
- We are researching an on-line subscription to Quick Books which would replace the old PC based version.
- A Finance Committee meeting will be scheduled soon to review the current year financial's and investments and to schedule the audit of financials.



A Discussion With Former State - Chapter President Richard Burr

What do Aaron Burr and Alexander Hamilton have in common? What is their relationship? I am sure you have read about the tenuous, contentious, and deadly connection they had, which left Secretary of Treasury Hamilton dead and Vice President Aaron Burr ostracised from the American government.



Well, there is another relationship. They, Burr and Alexander, are actually related! "What" you say?

Let me introduce you to Richard Burr, member of the South Jersey Chapter, former State and Chapter President. Rich is an avid genealogist, spending much of his retirement time

searching his computer for family connections. He has 18 stars that he wears on his neck ribbon to identify his 18 patriot ancestors. He wanted to get credit for a Tory who fought in the Revolutionary War, but that obviously doesn't count.



As a result of this Rich found out that both Burr and Hamilton. Currently he has 681,587 people in his family tree. Alexander Hamilton is his 6th removed, whereas Aaron Burr is his 4th cousin 6X removed.

Dr. Bodo Otto

Fifth Great Grandfather of Charles Morgan



Dr. Bodo Otto is the 5th Great Grandfather of NJSSAR Vice President Charlie Morgan. Dr. Otto was the son of Christopher Otto and Maria Magdalena Nienecken and was born in Germany about 1711. Around the age of 13, he began his education as a surgeon under the authority of the German government at the University of Göttingen. After graduating, he became a member of the College of Surgeons at Hildesheim, and Luneburg, and had charge of all the prisoners and invalids at the Fortress Kalkberg in Luneburg, Germany. Dr. Otto and his family (2nd wife and 4 children) arrived in Philadelphia on October 7 1755. Dr. Otto initially established his medical practice in Philadelphia and eventually moved to the Cohansey district in New Jersey, where his 2nd wife died in 1765. He continued living in New Jersey until shortly after his 3rd marriage. Apparently his new wife, who was English, did not like the wilds of southern Jersey and they relocated back to Philadelphia before ultimately relocating to Reading PA. Dr. Otto was one of the first skilled physicians and surgeons in the city of Reading, PA and he served as a member of the Committee of Berks County at the Pennsylvania Provincial Conference June 18 1775. He began his Revolutionary War military career in July 1776 at the age of 65.

He was named Surgeon of the Berks County PA militia battalion. He was present at the Battle of Long Island in August 1776 and lost all of his medical supplies and equipment. Thereafter the medical section of the Army was reorganized and Dr. Otto was transferred from field duty to hospital duty. Later in 1776 he was placed in charge of the hospital known as the Philadelphia Bettering House. He held the "rank" of Senior Surgeon by this time. In February 1777, he was sent to Trenton to inoculate the troops against Smallpox. Apparently he stayed in Trenton at the hospital in the Old Stone



Barracks as there are records indicating he was there in the fall of 1777 when the less seriously wounded from the Battle of Brandywine were sent to the Trenton hospital. In late 1777, Dr. Otto was transferred to the new hospital in Bethlehem, as the Trenton hospital had been ordered closed. Subsequently, Dr. Otto was transferred to the Yellow Springs

Hospital which was the principal hospital for the Valley Forge encampment. Washington Hall was built at Yellow Springs and Dr. Otto was ordered to take charge of the new hospital, which was full of the sick from Valley Forge, even before construction was completed. In June 1778, Dr. Otto was left in charge as Director of all hospitals in the Yellow Springs area when the Army moved out of Valley Forge and into New Jersey. In early 1780, Yellow Springs Hospital was reorganized and was then solely for those suffering lingering illnesses and for treatment and rehabilitation of the badly wounded. In late 1780, while still at Yellow Springs Hospital, Dr. Otto was elected a Hospital Physician and Surgeon by Congress as part of a reorganization of the Hospital Department. He remained there until the hospital was discontinued by order of the Board of War in September 1781. At that time, the patients still located at Yellow Springs were sent to Philadelphia. Dr. Otto moved with them as he had been ordered to "hold himself in readiness to join any other hospital where his services may be most wanted". On February 1, 1782 a reduction in the number of officers occurred, and Dr. Otto was discharged from the Army and re-established his medical practice in Philadelphia by mid Feb 1782.

Dr. Otto remained in Philadelphia for a short time before moving to Baltimore Maryland. He was back in Reading around 1784, and died there in 1789. He is buried in the cemetery of the Trinity Lutheran Church in Reading PA.
