History-Making Public/Nonprofit Partnership

A Partnership for the Restoration and Preservation of Howe Farmstead

This Effort is being spearheaded by Frank McGonigle



FRANKLIN NJ – **S**omerset County and the Somerset County Historical Society are developing a unique partnership that will enable the Society to lease and restore part of the prerevolutionary war era Howe Farmstead, located on Colonial Park. On March 9, the Board of County Commissioners approved a resolution authorizing the county and the Historical Society to enter into the lease agreement.

The idea was sparked when David Brook, who works with the Somerset County Historical Society, approached Commissioner Melonie Marano and indicated the nonprofit was very interested in restoring the Howe home and asked if the county would be willing to partner with them. "We moved on this idea very quickly. The generosity of the Howe family is what gave us a large portion of Colonial Park and Howe Athletic Field. By deeding their property to the county as open space, Dr. and Mrs. Howe saved a major

section of Franklin Township from development and gave us a crown jewel for generations and generations to come where people can recreate, dogs run free, and athletes play in the fields," said Commissioner Melonie Marano, open space liaison. "I can't even imagine how different Somerset County would be today if we did not have Colonial Park."

The Howe Farmstead, 70 acres in all, includes a farmhouse, wagon house, large English barn, chicken house and a "hired man's" house. The Somerset County Historical Society is looking to lease and restore the farmhouse, which has been vacant for a few years, with the help of grant funding. "We are humbled by this opportunity to put our money where our mouth is and walk the talk. This is a pivotal moment in our history as an historical society to be able to expand our reach in the greater Somerset County area," said Rikki Lynn Hauss, a trustee of the Somerset County Historical Society. "Not only is this a pre-revolutionary home but it is also the story of how the Howe's not only made this their home but made it adaptable from the minute they took ownership until we were able to pick up where they left off."

Dr. Eugene and Lois Howe, who met at age 7 in a one-room schoolhouse in Kansas, moved their family to Somerset County in 1947. Having grown up in a farming community, the Howes looked for a place where they would feel most at home. They found that place in the northern section of Franklin Township. Years later, Eugene and Lois Howe created a living trust in which they deeded their property to Somerset County as open space, now known as Colonial Park."I am heartfelt in my gratitude for the generosity of the Howe family on behalf of all our residents and park visitors. Especially this past year, when we were all couped up in our homes and the only place people really could go out was to the parks," said Commissioner Marano.

Dr. and Mrs. Howe did even more for preservation than deed their land to Somerset County as open space. To some they are considered the father and mother of the historic preservation movement in Franklin Township. "I knew the Howes personally when I was involved in the Meadows Foundation back in the 70's. They were the nicest people you would ever have had the privilege to have known," said David Brook, former member of the Meadows Foundation. "Gene and Lois also were staunch advocates for historic preservation. They helped to found the Meadows Foundation and were responsible for the acquisition of the Van Wickle House, Blackwells Mills Canal House, the Hageman Farm, the Wykoff-Garretson House and the Van Liew-Suydan House.

"I think it's safe for me to say that none of these well-known historic structures and properties would be standing today if it weren't for the Howe's willingness to contribute financially and physically to rally the resources and the community members to stand up for the value of historic preservation," said Brook. "I think this initiative represents a new beginning with a new model for success by bringing together the County with a respected nonprofit to establish a new partnership for preservation and community development."

"We want to thank everyone involved for their dedication. This unique partnership is beneficial because restoration initiatives like this cannot be done alone," said Commissioner Deputy Director Sara Sooy. "It's such an important part of Somerset County to make sure that we maintain our historic sites and keep reinvesting in that."

A Look Back at the Origins of the Lyons VA Hospital in Lyons, NJ

The Lyons VA Hospital at Lyons, New Jersey, has its origins in the 1920s, when the Sixty-eighth Congress passed an act authorizing appropriations to provide hospital and outpatient facilities for veterans under the World War Veterans Act of 1924. The act was signed into law (Public Law #587) by President Calvin Coolidge on March 3, 1925. Coolidge's signature authorized \$10 million to the U.S. Veterans Bureau to construct and improve existing disabled veterans hospitals across the United States.

On November 28, 1928, after review of 161 potential sites across the state, the Federal Board of Hospitalization recommended the purchase of the 272- acre estate of Walter A. Reynolds known as "Knollcroft" in the rolling countryside of Somerset Hills in the Lyons section of Bernards Township.

The Infamous HMS Jersey, As Told by Some Who Survived it \backsim

When the British occupied New York from 1776 till the end of the war they needed a place to jail the thousands of American soldiers and sailors who were captured in battle or arrested for refusing to swear and oath of allegiance to the British Crown. They were prisoners of war who were abused by guards on 16 prison ships off Brooklyn's shores.

The HMS Jersey earned the nickname of "Hell" for horrible conditions and excessively high death rates of prisoners. Between 8-10 men died every-night from diseases such as small pox, typhoid, dysentery and yellow fever, as well as from the effects of starvation and torture. Their corpses were tossed overboard or were buried in low graves next to the shoreline which was eroding , causing bodies to wash away over the years.

Christopher Vail, a soldier from Southhold was a prisoner on the Jersey in 1781 and survived to later write "When a man died he was carried up on the forecastle and laid there until the next morning until 8 O'Clock when they were all lowered down the ship sides by a rope round them in the same manner as tho' they were beasts. There was 8 died of a day while i was there. They were carried on shore in heaps and hove out the boat on the wharf then taken across a hand barrow, carried to the edge of the bank where a hole was dug 1 or 2 feet deep and all hove in together. It was reported that 11,700 and odd was buried at this place and in this manner"

One of the prison survivors was the poet Philip Freneau who was a sea captain, and newspaper editor from

Matawan, NJ. who spent six weeks on the *Scorpion*. He detailed his experiences in *The British Prison Ship*, and afterward wrote more patriotic and anti-British writings throughout the revolution. For this he earned the nickname " The Poet of the Revolution".

Robert Brown, a U.S. Representative from Pennsylvania was captured at the surrender of Fort Washington and worked as a blacksmith while a prisoner of the ship *Judith*.

Another survivor was Christopher Hawkins, who at 13 joined a ship in 1777 to fight the British. He was captured and escaped the Jersey and journaled his adventures in 1834 when he was 70 years old. Hawkins wrote of stealing an axe and breaking through a barred porthole during a thunderstorm.

Robert Sheffield escaped from the ship in 1778 and told his story in the *Connecticut Gazette*, "The heat was so intense that (the hot sun shining all day on deck) they were all naked, which also served them well to get rid of vermin, but the sick were eaten up alive".

Even after the British surrendered in 1781 prisoners were kept aboard the ships until the war formerly ended in 1783. At that time there was only 1400 survivors among the entire prison ship fleet, at least 11,000 boys and men had died. In 1808 the burial vault near the navy yard had collapsed and the remains of the dead were re interred in Fort Green Park. One hundred years later President Taft dedicated the *Prison Ship Martyrs Monument*, an obelisk atop a crypt of coffins holding bone fragments from the thousands who died on the 16 prison ships.

Portrait of a Patriot Ancestor

As a child I often wondered about my ancestors. Beyond my Parents, my Grandparents, and a couple of Great-Grandparents, no one had any information. My paternal grandmother, Emma Whitaker (1888 – 1971) was the daughter of William Alfred Whitaker (1854 – 1913) and Nancy Post (1855 – 1916). Years ago, she told us the story of her ancestors on the Post side. She claimed that the family was the Lagire family in the Netherlands. The family came to America after the Mayflower (the Mayflower arrived in 1620) and changed their name to Post after having first seen a Postman on arrival. The basic story is consistent with the facts but had some inaccuracies.

We are Descendants of Immigrants

Following the direct line of ancestors, my 10th Great-Grandfather was Barent Jansen b: abt. 1594 in Harlingen, Friesland, Netherlands and d: 1647 in New Amsterdam, New York. His Son (my 9th Great-Grandfather) was Jan Barentsen, b: 1620 in the Netherlands, d: 1669 in Postenkill, Rensselaer, New York.

The progenitor of our Post family of Westchester and Rockland Counties, New York, and Bergen County, New Jersey, is believed to be Jan Janszen [Postmael] (my 8th Great-Grandfather and Son of Jan Barentsen), born about 1650, a native of Harlingen, Holland, who married about 1679, Jannetje (Jeanne) LeSueur [origin of Lagire?], born about 1660, daughter of Francois Le Sueur (progenitor of the Lozier/Losier family) and Jannetje Hillebrants Pieterson. "He arrived in America sometime before 1679." "Jan Janszen, acquired the surname of Postmael from the occupation of mail carrier [not having seen a postman]..." [History of Harlem by Riker, footnote page 388.]

Revolutionary War

Jan Janszen's 2nd Great-Grandson was Abraham A. Post (my 4th Great-Grandfather, 1756 – 1805), son of Jan Post and Maria Schoonmaker (5th Great-Grandparents.) Abraham A. Post served as a Private in the Ulster County Militia, 1st Regiment (Col. Johannes Snyder), Capt. Matt Dederick Co. "New York in the Revolution, Office of the State Controller" (James A. Roberts), Albany, 1897", page 189.

He was a signer of Articles of Association during the Revolution May 29 1775. "Among the first prominent events in the



history of Ulster during the Revolution was the signing of the Articles of Association adopted by the citizens of the city of New York who were favorable to the cause of liberty." [History of Ulster County, New York", Nathaniel B. Sylvester, 1880, page 72.]

Civil War

Abraham's Grandson was Henry E. Post (my 2nd GGF, 1824 – 1864). He enlisted on 14 Aug 1862 at Troy, NY as a Private and mustered into "G" Co. NY 125th Infantry on 27 Aug 1862. He was captured at the Battle of Harper's Ferry, VA, listed as a POW on 15 Sep 1862, and was paroled the next day. He fought at Gettysburg, PA in July 1863. He fought in the Battle of Mine Run, VA and was captured on 2 Dec 1863. He was listed as a POW and was sent to Andersonville prison where he died of scorbutus (scurvy) on 15 Dec 1864. He is buried at Andersonville National Cemetery, GA (Grave: Section H, Site12291).
